The first five weeks of 2025 have flown past, mostly due to the enormous number of events and activities that have taken place.

- The MacKillop Dinner, at which we celebrated the College's top 10 students from the 2024 HSC and honoured Vicki Evans for her significant contributions to the MacKillop community, was a wonderful evening.
- Our College Opening Mass, celebrated by Fr Paul Devitt and attended by well over 800 people, highlighted our catholicity and community spirit.
- The College Swimming Carnival lived up to expectation and was a great mix of competition and fun.
- Fifteen of our Year 12 students, accompanied by Mrs Marjoram and Mr Kreuzberger, enjoyed an informative overnight visit to the University of Wollongong Discovery Day.

- The College's 58th birthday was celebrated on Wednesday 26 February. We were joined by 30 former staff members, Fr Paul Devitt and our wonderful Josephite and Mercy Sisters all of whom, along with all of our students and staff, were treated to cake to mark the occasion.
- Last week, our Year 7 students had a fantastic school camp experience at the Narrabeen Sport and Recreation Park, where they engaged with a wide range of fun and challenging activities.
- Today we recognised International Women's Day, with some community activities led by our senior and junior council members. Last night a group of students and staff represented the College at the International Women's Day Dinner at Bathurst Goldfields.

It has certainly been a huge start to the school year and things won't be slowing down as the term progresses. Already on the horizon we are looking forward to the combined College Musical, "You're a Good Man Charlie Brown", performances of which are on from Wednesday 2 April to Saturday 6 April. HSC Disability Provisions

The NSW Educational Standards Authority (NESA) may approve special examination provisions for the Higher School Certificate examinations if a student has a special need that would, in a normal exam situation, prevent her from reading the exam questions or communicating her responses.

Provisions may include large print papers, use of a writer or a reader, extension of test time, rest break

Provisions may include large print papers, use of a writer or a reader, extension of test time, rest breaks, separate supervision or other provisions as judged appropriate.

If you feel your daughter, who is completing HSC examinations this year, may benefit from disability provisions, please contact either myself or Mrs Natalie Horsburgh at the College. Applications require submission by the end of this term.

NAPLAN

Why NAPLAN Matters

NAPLAN reflects key areas of literacy and numeracy, foundational to lifelong learning. Conducted annually for Years 3, 5, 7, and 9, it assesses skills in reading, writing, spelling, grammar, and numeracy. While not the sole measure of ability, it offers a snapshot of progress and helps students build resilience under test conditions.

The Value of NAPLAN Data

For parents, NAPLAN data highlights your child's strengths and areas for growth. For teachers, it informs targeted strategies to meet individual and class needs. On a broader scale, NAPLAN helps our schools:

- Identify trends and evaluate teaching methods.
- Allocate resources effectively.
- Enhance educational outcomes collaboratively.

Working Together for Your Child

NAPLAN is just one tool among many. We approach it with a supportive mindset, encouraging students to do their best while emphasising their broader talents. Open conversations with your child about NAPLAN's purpose can foster confidence, and regular communication with teachers ensures we are collectively supporting their learning.

NAPLAN Tests commence on Wednesday 12 March for Years 7 & 9. Parents are reminded that students will require a fully charged device with headphones/earpods for each of these tests.

COMPASS Reports - Year 7, 9, 11

Testing results from 2024 have now been uploaded to Compass.

Parents of Year 7 students will be able to see the report from the testing conducted in Term 4 of last year by Academic Assessment Services. Parents of Years 9 and 11 will be able to see the results from the VALID Testing completed last year. The Validation of Assessment for Learning and Individual Development (VALID) Science assessments can be used as a diagnostic tool to assist in improving student outcomes in science and as a tool for program evaluation. The test is linked to the science syllabuses, and assesses what students know and can do in science. It also provides useful information about student attitudes towards science.


Ash Wednesday

Student Voice- Immersion Team Members Mia and Matilda Service in Vietnam and Cambodia

Hello readers! This is Mia and Matilda from the 2025 Vietnam/Cambodia Immersion Team. We and 21 other students are stepping beyond the classroom and into the heart of Southeast Asia, embarking on the Vietnam and Cambodia immersion trip and are all set for an unforgettable experience. From exploring the remnants of war to connecting with people through service and cultural exchange, the trip promises to challenge perspectives, deepen understanding, and leave lasting memories.

Making the true meaning of this trip a reality requires support. Our goal is to raise \$4300 overall to support our service endeavours. This money will be used to build a home for a Vietnamese family in need so they can live in a more sustainable and homely environment, as everyone deserves. These families currently live in basic conditions, with dirt floors, corrugated walls and openings rather than windows. Building them a home with tiled floors, brick walls, windows and, most importantly, electricity is life-changing, not just for themselves but for the generations of their family who will live in this house for years to come. Our team will be doing all of the manual labour for the building. We look forward to mixing mortar, bricklaying and tiling over three full days. However, the money raised is needed to buy these resources and to help pay for local labourers to help us.

Fundraising will be crucial in contributing to essential service initiatives to help others who need it most. Through various events and activities, the school and the outer community will have the chance to come together and hopefully help us help this family. An example of this is our upcoming car wash on March 30th! Our team will be washing cars all day in the Anzac Garden on our school grounds. This will be just one of our many fundraisers throughout the year, so stay tuned for more information to come.

We and our team are beyond excited for this journey and the impact we hope to make. We're proud to be implementing TRP's evidence-based whole school wellbeing program. Students will engage in weekly lessons to understand and strengthen their practice of Gratitude, Empathy, Mindfulness and Emotional Literacy.

Gratitude



Gratitude involves recognising and expressing appreciation for the people, places and things in our lives. Practising gratitude allows us to pay attention to what we have, increasing feelings of happiness and leading to a more positive outlook on life.

Empathy



Empathy involves understanding others' feelings and perspectives and is practised through kindness, compassion and curiosity. Developing empathy fosters deeper connections, increases our likelihood of acting kindly, and helps us experience positive emotions.

Mindfulness



The practice of mindfulness is about an awareness of life as we are living it.

It allows us to be responsive to our experiences rather than being reactive, and to live with greater balance, presence and connection.

Emotional Literacy



Emotional Literacy involves learning to identify and label our emotions, as well as developing emotional regulation skills. When we can accurately name our feelings and emotions, it reduces the impact of uncomfortable emotions and enhances the effect of positive ones.



Students Shine in the ACER Advance Awards 2024

In Term 4 last year, twenty students from each of our Year 7, Year 8 and Year 9 cohorts took part in the ACER Advance Awards Competition. This national competition is designed to test students on their literacy and numeracy skills, challenging them to apply their knowledge in real-world problem-solving tasks.

Recently we received results from the competition and MacKillop was named amongst an extensive list of prestigious schools across Australia, with five students gaining Distinctions, fourteen Credit awards, and seven Merit awards. English-Year 7















Our Year 9 and Year 10 Italian students have been diving into the vibrant world of 'Carnevale di Venezia' (The Carnival of Venice), a centuries-old tradition celebrated annually in Venice, Italy. The Carnival ends on Shrove Tuesday, just before Lent begins on Ash Wednesday. Our students have not only explored the historical and cultural significance of Carnevale di Venezia but have also engaged actively in hands-on learning by creating their own masks.

English-Years 11 & 12



Our Year 11 students have settled quickly into their chosen English classes (learning the importance of communication and collaboration to gain success in their senior courses) and are exploring the modules of Reading to Write (in Advanced and Standard) and Achieving Through English in English Studies.

MATHEMATICS

How To Get The Most Out Of Your Year In Mathematics

Mathematics is such an important subject for students to learn, and attitude plays a huge part in a student's experience. If we think of maths as something that is naturally easy for some people and hard for others, we create a barrier that is very difficult to get past. However, if we think of maths as an opportunity to embrace the struggle and learn how to cope with challenges, we become students who can handle the toughest senior subjects and can move through setbacks in life. Parents have a very important role in supporting their child at home in their learning.

It makes a huge difference to a student's experience of mathematics when parents and guardians:

- Are positive in their approach to mathematics at home
- Praise effort and not just correct solutions
- Support regular practice of mathematics
- Encourage their young mathematicians to embrace the struggle

The work can be challenging sometimes, but students become better mathematicians just by having a go and asking for help when it is needed.

This year, Maths Mentoring will be on every Thursday at lunch time in Room 6. Drop in for five minutes to ask a question, or bring your lunch and come along to work on a particular skill. You might like to bring your homework to get help with the harder questions, or just sit and work through some revision with your friends. A teacher will be there to help you out if you need some hints. As always, students can still go to their teachers for help, but Maths Mentoring is an extra option to seek out assistance.

Following the Smoking Ceremony, artworks created by Indigenous students and Aboriginal Artist, Sandon, were showcased and presented to teachers, students, families and Elders. Students stood beside their work as they shared the connections and Stories behind their pieces. Some spoke about their connection to Country, while others reflected on their personal experiences as young Indigenous women in our community.

The day provided a deadly start to our 2025 and set the stage for celebrating and embracing culture throughout the year.

'How We Came To Be'

"We started with a blank canvas, we first created the river which represents Mother Nature. From the river came the families and the 'family community'. In the centre each student chose a Native animal to represent their family. After family came the two communities, our MacKillop Community in orange and blue and our Wiradjuri community in blue and brown. All the other communities that we are connected to are represented in white in our artwork. We live alongside our animals, they are shown by the scattered animal tracks on our painting."

'Belonging'

"The centre circle represents the sun, it is the connection of the whole artwork. The multi-coloured circles surrounding the sun represent our families. In the centre of these circles is the Aboriginal symbol for women. Our handprints are a symbol of belonging to the land and our culture. The rivers on either side of the sun represent our three rivers, Wambuul (Macquarie), the Galari (Lachlan) and the Marrambidya (Murrumbidgee). The different colours that we have embraced within our artwork show our individuality and also how we connect through culture."

'Our Home

"Our artwork involves the two rivers most commonly known in our town, the Wambuul (Macquarie) and the Marrambidya (Murrumbidgee). Each one of us has our own path and family circle representing our story through our culture. Along our artwork we have animal tracks that are found on our beautiful country, these include the Emu, Kangaroo, Goanna and Frog. The centre of the artwork represents our home. We are all connected via our paths and connect us all as one."

'Wiradjuri Connection'

"Our artwork represents our culture always being connected through community. The centerpiece of our artwork represents our Indigenous Community of MacKillop College with our Aboriginal Education Officer (AEO). She is represented by the central women of the group with her totem, the Sea Hawk, placed within her. Our AEO is surrounded by each member of the group to symbolise our connections with her. Each member of the group painted their own homes and family around the centrepiece and placed their totems within them, these include Goanna, Kookaburra, Sea Hawk and Kangaroo. Each family has a path connected to them to show connection to each other. The river flowing through our artwork is the Wambuul (Macquarie) river to represent Bathurst and Wiradjuri Country."







Bus Pass Update 2025

Bathurst Buslines wishes to advise all parents, students, and guardians that those students who are eligible and have been approved for a 2025 School Bus pass these will be posted to the students home/postal address after the 24 January 2025. We do ask for your patience due to delivery times through Australia Post. If you do not receive your bus pass by the 10 February 2025 please contact Bathurst Buslines.

Please note that there is a moratorium period until Friday 28 February 2025 which allows sufficient time for eligible students to receive their travel passes.

Please ensure that once your child receives their 2025 Bus Pass, they must show this to the Bus Driver each time they board the bus.
